1. Mission

Psychology is the science of finding the answer to the question, “how does the human mind and behavior work?”. The core features that determine human beings are the human mind and behavior. Psychology studies how the human mind and behavior interact with natural and artificial environments and ponders what role they play in complex society. The science of Psychology focuses on finding ways to improve the quality of human life by investigating the human mind and behavior more scientifically. This then illuminates the foundational principles on which the human mind and behavior operate.

Because Psychology deals with studying the human mind and behavior, there are various topics and specialties within the field. Thus, to narrow the specific area of study, there are two broad categories to choose from, Basic and Applied Psychology. Basic Psychology deals with the fundamental processes of the human mind and includes Developmental Psychology and Cognitive Psychology, Perceptual Psychology, Learning Psychology, Personality Psychology, Social Psychology, and Neuropsychology. Applied Psychology seeks to solve the problems in society and contributes to improving the quality of human life by applying the knowledge of Basic Psychology to our lives. Applied Psychology includes Clinical Psychology, Counseling Psychology, Industrial and Organizational Psychology, Health Psychology, Consumer Psychology, Advertising Psychology, and Criminal Psychology.

The Department of Psychology was established in March of 1979 to foster steady and reliable psychologists. The program presently has 11 faculty members with diverse professional specialties and backgrounds. Since the first student graduated in 1983, numerous alumni have been working in fields such as domestic and foreign companies, research laboratories, public organizations, and health clinics. Currently, about 300 undergraduates and 90 graduates are enrolled.

4. Branches of Psychology

1) Clinical Psychology

Clinical psychology is the psychological specialty that provides continuing and comprehensive mental and behavioral health care for individuals and families; consultation to agencies and communities; training, education and supervision; and research-based practice. It is a specialty in breadth — one that is broadly inclusive of severe psychopathology — and marked by comprehensiveness and integration of knowledge and skill from a broad array of disciplines within and outside of psychology proper. The scope of clinical psychology encompasses all ages, multiple diversities, and varied systems.

2) Counseling Psychology

Counseling Psychology is a specialty within professional psychology that maintains a focus on facilitating personal and interpersonal functioning across the lifespan. The practice of Counseling Psychology encompasses a broad range of culturally-sensitive practices that help people improve their well-being, alleviate distress and maladjustment, resolve crises, and increase their ability to function better in their lives. With its attention to both normal developmental issues and problems associated with physical, emotional, and mental disorders, the specialization holds a unique perspective in the broader practice-based areas of psychology.

3) Industrial and Organizational Psychology

Industrial and organizational psychology (I/O psychology) is the science of human behavior relating to work and applies psychological theories and principles to organizations and individuals in their places of work as well as the individual's work-life more generally. I/O psychologists are trained in the scientist-practitioner model. They contribute to an organization's success by improving the performance, motivation, job satisfaction, and occupational safety and health as well as the overall health and well-being of its employees. An I/O psychologist conducts research on employee behaviors

and attitudes, and how these can be improved through hiring practices, training programs, feedback, and management systems.

4) Cognitive Psychology

Cognitive psychology involves the study of mental processes—all of the things that go on inside your brain, including perception, thinking, memory, attention, language, problem-solving, and learning. There are numerous practical applications for this cognitive research, such as providing help coping with memory disorders, increasing decision-making accuracy, finding ways to help people recover from brain injury, treating learning disorders, and structuring educational curricula to enhance learning.

2. 1 English course is required for entering students after 2014. Students can earn credits in English courses the Psych department offers or it can be replaced by a score of above 500 in TOEIC.
3. Graduation thesis is required for entering students after 2015 and it can be replaced by satisfying one of the below requirements. Also, maximum 3 people can work together for the thesis.
 - ① Certificate: one or more certificates in Clinical Psychology Practitioner, Vocational Counselor, Survey analyst, or General Psychologist
 - ② TOEIC: above 750
4. In the case of above 750 in TOEIC, English course and thesis can be exempted
Ex) 500-749 in TOEIC: English course can be exempted
750-990 in TOEIC: Both of English course and thesis can be exempted

4. Failure and Expulsion

- Academic Probation: A student holding a 1.50 GPA for the semester. However, the student's final semester is excluded.
- Expulsion due to Academic Probation: A student receiving academic probation for 3 consecutive semesters
- A student being regarded as being beyond hope of academic achievement due to illness.
- A student not having registered or not having submitted the application for extension of leave of absence within the time specified after leave of absence.
- A student entering another university.
- A student not having registered within the time specified.
- A student being subject to expulsion due to academic probation.
- A student being subject to expulsion due to disciplinary action.

3. Student Employment

When the student's first job is an internship (15 academic credits) during the student's second semester of 4th year, the student can work for a company linked with the school by recommendation of the professor (annual change and recommendation company change)

<Confirmation of Employment of Early Employment for the Upcoming Graduation Semester>

-Eligibility: Early employment students during the final semester

-Attendance Recognition: Classes during the period of employment

A) The whole period of confirmed employment as an early employee who is expected to graduate

B) The period of employment due to leave from school midway.

- Confirmation of Employment and Attendance Recognition Procedure

Step 1: Confirm Employment

- (1) Application for confirmation of early employment (within two weeks of the start date)
- (2) Confirmation of early employment (confirmed by the employment support team)
- (3) Release of early employment confirmation certificate (within one week after confirmation)
- (4) Submission of confirm certificate to the course professor (within 2 weeks of the date of entry)

Step 2: Attendance Recognition Procedure

- (1) Attendance application (before the end of the semester examination)
- (2) Recognition of Attendance (Recognition of Attendance is often accepted by the Employment Support Team after applying for attendance)
- (3) Acknowledgment of attendance (before the regular examination end date)
- (4) Submission of certificate of early work attendance to subject professor (before the end of semester examination)
 - Confirmation documents for each type of employment: Documents related to employment confirmation and attendance recognition by the employment support team, and the student prints a certificate of employment and a certificate of attendance in the EDWARD system and submits it to the professor in charge of the curriculum.

4. Compass K

► Introduction of Program

- Developed to enhancing learning capability and job competitiveness of current students
- Consisting of 7 sectors: goals management, major, globalization, IT, volunteer service creativity, career and employment
- Classifies student's learning capability into 18 items to be managed.

► Purpose of Point System

- To set career objectives earlier and to give motivation for developing learning capability
- To manage competitiveness in employment through preparation for individual portfolio
- To manage job seekers and successful candidates in employment
- To organize program: career search, career counseling, capability management
- To grant scholarship in the form of point for capability development
- Point approvals: the items related to grade evaluation and credit acquisition are automatically processed on the system.
- After the student enters the information on the web, he / she must provide evidence (certificate or original certificate) to administration.
- One achievement is recognized as an ability in a single sector. (One achievement cannot be recognized in two or more sectors.)
